Dear Parents/Carers,

I hope you have had a great week and have managed to keep yourself warm and dry as the weather continues to be cooler than usual. We now only have three weeks until the end of the 2022 school year and there is a great deal happening. Please refer to the important dates for the remainder of the year in the date section of this newsletter.

This coming Sunday marks the beginning of the liturgical season of Advent, the season that we wait in joyful anticipation for the birth of Jesus at Christmas. As a Catholic community this is a very important time of year for us. During Advent we spend much time reflecting on what it means to be a follower of Jesus, and praying for peace in our world. We pray for the peace and love that the birth of the Christ child promises. Over the coming weeks our students will be hosting a number of Advent Liturgies. I encourage all members of our school community to attend these and join with our children in joyful anticipation.

Exceptional Education

Student Reports will go home to all families on Friday December 9th. These reports will provide you with a snapshot of your child, their achievements throughout Semester Two and the many qualities that assist them in their learning. Congratulations to our students on their wonderful achievements throughout 2022 and many thanks to our dedicated teachers who have worked so hard in recent weeks in producing these reports. Learning Conversations will be held on Monday 12th of December 1.30 pm - 8.00 pm, these will be held virtually and your child/ren are to attend. Please see next week's newsletter for booking details. A reminder school concludes at 1.00pm on this day.

As you are aware there appears to be another COVID wave on the rise, we have only had a few reported cases of COVID in our community and we would like to keep it that way. This is a reminder we need to remain vigilant to ensure that we stop the spread and keep our students, staff and community safe ahead of the upcoming school holiday break. Please make sure that if your child is unwell and displaying COVID symptoms that they are kept at home until they are well again. Today another installment of Rapid Antigen Tests will be given to your child to help with early detection. Your ongoing support is greatly appreciated as we continue to work together to ensure all in our community remain healthy and safe.

As you are aware we are committed to creating and maintaining a child safe and child friendly school. We work collectively to create a place where all children and young people are safe and feel safe. In a recent newsletter to families, we announced the implementation of new Child Safe Standards that took effect from July 2022 across all schools and organisations. This change has resulted in an increase in the number of standards from seven to eleven and aimed at further strengthening practices across all organisations, including schools. As part of the implementation process, we have begun reviewing important child safe policies, ensuring they align with these new changes. Please see our school website for a comprehensive list of all policies relating directly to child safety.



2022 Our Lady Help of Christians School Advisory Council Annual Report

Dear OLHC community,

With the end of the year approaching, we are pleased to present the 2022 Our Lady Help of Christians School Advisory Council Annual Report. The report summarises the key activities, achievements and challenges of the council and committees over the past year, and the focus for next year.

Background:

Late in 2021 the school called for interested parties to submit an expression of interest in devising a School Advisory Council. Membership to the council was advertised via the school newsletter and a submission of an Expression of Interest (EOI) was called for. Members were not elected but instead the EOIs were reviewed and members were appointed by the principal, as delegated custodian by the Parish Priest. Appointments considered diversity in gender, culture, skill and experience.

Membership and Committees:

The following membership appointments were made for 2022/2023 School Advisory Council: Sam Brumale (Chair), Carmen Roberts (Secretary), Sam Brumale, Howard McCorkell, Catherine Muhlebach, Alvin Ng, Carmen Roberts, Catherine Spurritt, Samantha Thompson (Parents), Fr Greg Bourke, Fr Linh Phan (Parish), Maree McIntosh, Jackie McGrath (Staff).

The Terms of Reference for the School Advisory Council were presented by Robert Aron (Governance Team - Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools), including a discussion on key and individual roles, as well as establishing the following Sub-Committees to focus on key areas:

- Community Engagement (Catherine Spurritt, Maree McIntosh, Jackie McGrath)
- Master Planning (Sam Brumale, Howard McCorkell, Maree McIntosh, Catherine Muhlebach, Samantha Thompson)
- Media/Marketing (Howard McCorkell, Maree McIntosh, Carmen Roberts)
- · Parent Association/Finance (Sam Brumale, Maree McIntosh, Alvin Ng).

During 2022, the School Advisory Council met four times on 22nd February, 5th May, 8th August and 25th October.

The Sub Committees each met six times during the year:

- Community Engagement Committee and the Parent Association/Finance Committee on 22nd March, 3rd May, 14th June, 19th July, 8th August, 11th October
- Master Planning Committee and Marketing/Advertising Committee on 23rd March, 4th May, 15th June, 20th July, 31 August and 12 October.

Key Highlights

Each of our meetings commences with Acknowledgement of Country and a prayer, to remind us of our commitment to respecting our First Nations People and our Catholic faith, to allow us a moment to centre our thoughts on what is important with a continued focus on the school's Vision.

Enlivened by the life of Jesus with the love and compassion of Our Lady, we are a community of faith and learning; valuing diversity and respect for all.

The children's education and wellbeing are always at the heart of every discussion.

Our wonderful Principal Maree McIntosh, leadership team, teachers and support staff all work very hard to ensure the school Vision is met and to foster our children's future.

During the year, areas presented by Maree for discussion and review by the School Advisory Council included:

- Engaging Families in Child Safety Policy
- New Child Safety Standards
- · Regular updates on Master Plan development of both building and grounds
- · Updates about school enrolments and the Year Prep intake for 2023
- Updates about the school operations and teaching including the successful Inquiry program led by Jackie McGrath with participation from many members of the parent community.

The other main achievements and challenges covered by School Advisory Council and the respective committees are summarised below:

- Media and marketing committee advised on ways to promote the school and its values. It aims to support the school with enrolment initiatives as well as external learning experiences for our students. The Committee helped arrange updated photographs for the school website and new brochures and materials. The Committee also supported the 'Little Learners Love Literacy' banners on Nicholson and Miller Street frontages which have generated enrolment interest.
- Community engagement committee advised on ways to enhance engagement and involvement with our culturally diverse and rich OLHC community. During the year, the Committee has supported the schools Inquiry program and helped parent share their experience with the children.
- The Master Planning committee advised on the maintenance and projects for school buildings and grounds. The committee helped steer the development of the School Master Plan (for buildings and indoor spaces) and the Master Landscape Plan (for the outdoor spaces). The Committee assisted with a grant application to improve the school facilities. In October, the school was successful in its application securing \$1.97 million to carry out improvement works to the Miller Street buildings including the library and 2 learning spaces. You will start to see activity sometime next year! The Committee also endorsed the new Kitchen Garden which was a preferred suggestion from the children consulted during the development of the Master Landscape Plan. Smaller landscaping and tree planting projects for the main yard and along Nicholson Street were also endorsed. The picture below provides a snapshot of the design for the kitchen garden and images to indicate some of the proposed features.



Parents Association / Finance Committee advised and supported the Parents' Association by focusing on targeted improvement projects and to help identify additional fundraising opportunities. We acknowledge the huge effort that the Parents' Association members put into the successfully run events including the recent end of year disco, the triathlon, pizza lunches and the fundraising raffles. All members are volunteers juggling family and their own work commitments. The events organised by the Parents' Association raised over \$30,000 which go back into the school. \$10,800 was used to buy new take home reading material generated by funds raised in 2021. This year \$17,371.23 was raised during the Triathlon and a further \$10,724.50 was raised at the Family Disco, these funds will go towards the establishment of the Kitchen Garden. We sincerely acknowledge and thank the Parents' Association for the work they have done for our school community. And we thank you for participating in these events and towards the funds raised.

In 2023, the School Advisory Committee will continue to represent the best interests of Our Lady's Help of Christians and support the principal and leadership team to provide the best possible education for our children.

Finally, as we near the end of the first year of the School Advisory Council, the first year free from lockdown since the commencement of the COVID 19 pandemic, the Council collectively extends our thanks to the principal and all the staff for their amazing work and endless hours.

I would also like to express my personal gratitude to all members of the 2022 School Advisory Council. Thank you for your passion and commitment, your respect and your kindness.

On behalf of the Council, I wish you all the best for the remainder of 2022, followed by an exciting and peaceful 2023.

INSIGHTS

Growing up is not straight-forward



The pandemic has delivered change and upheaval to families on an enormous scale. However upheaval is not new for some children, particularly those who've experienced illness, a loss of a loved one or who've moved home and changed schools. Each change requires acceptance, adjustment and an attitude realignment to help them fit the new circumstances. Every change is an opportunity for a child to grow and develop, if they are supported, and they're not overwhelmed by the experience.

The twists and turns of development

A child's pathway to adulthood, and the accompanying journey of their parents, is generally viewed as linear. Growing up is seen as a straightforward march from infancy, early childhood, childhood, adolescence, post-adolescence to adulthood. If COVID has taught us anything it's that a child's journey is full of twists and turns.

While your child has a developmental clock that keeps ticking over, it's their experiences that determine their maturity and their ability to reach fully-fledged adulthood with the resilience, grit and adaptability needed to thrive. These experiences that develop maturity and coping capacities fit into two broad areas – challenging experiences and positive experiences.

Challenging Experiences

The challenging experiences that a child encounters enable them to build their coping capacities and develop their emotional resources that contribute to their maturity. These challenges include:

Conflict

Disagreements, arguments and rivalry is part of growing up. Whether it's a dispute with siblings or a fallout with a friend, negotiating conflict is a developmental task.

Rejection

Rejection by a friend or group is hurtful and feels horrible, but it also builds a level of social smarts and judgement necessary for navigating relationships in later life.

Loss

This takes many forms including a friend moving away, the death of a pet or the passing of a family member. Loss is the cause of sadness, grief and heartbreak that can feel overwhelming. However, with time and support kids learn to cope and get on with their lives.

Disappointment

Losing a game, not being picked for a team, not receiving a gift they wanted are unpleasant but character-building experiences that help kids develop perhaps the most treasured resilience capability of them all – acceptance.

Failure

Mistakes are seen in three ways. They are activities to be avoided, signs of failure, or opportunities for further learning. Resilient learners know that mistakes, even initial failures, are part of every learning process so the risk of failure doesn't hold them back. Children and young people grow from these experiences as coping and recovery generally build character, confidence and resilience.

Positive experiences

Though children and young people will inevitably experience challenging experiences, positive experiences help to balance the experience ledger by building a child's identity, wellbeing and emotional collateral.

Love

Knowing that a child is loved and loveable is at the core of their self-worth. Self-esteem and identity built in adolescence needs a solid foundation of self-worth.

Friendship

Making and keeping friends is an essential life task linked to many aspects of happiness and wellbeing.

Contribution

The ability to belong to groups through contribution fulfils a basic need. It allows children to experience real gratitude and feel needed, which builds self-esteem.

Excitement

Fun, joy, excitement! Any activity that shifts a child's emotion from unpleasant, low energy to pleasant and high energy is a good thing.

Play

Involvement in enjoyable activities such as hobbies, interests, sports, music, games, creative and performance arts are central to healthy wellbeing. Activities that are fun, freely chosen and create flow (the ability to lose track of time) fit the criteria of play.

In closing

A child's age and related milestones is a recognised marker of their development. However, their life experiences, as much as the number of birthdays they've had, contribute to their maturity, resilience and readiness for the wider world.


